About the Production

George Bernard Shaw (1856-1950) was born in Dublin, the son of a civil servant. His education was irregular, due to his dislike of any organized training. After working in an estate agent's office for a while he moved to London in 1876 where he established himself as a leading music and theatre critic.

He decided to write plays in order to illustrate his criticism of the English stage. His earliest dramas were called appropriately Plays Pleasant and Unpleasant (1898). Among these, Widower's Houses and Mrs. Warren's Profession savagely attack social hypocrisy, while in plays such as Arms and the Man and The Man of Destiny the criticism is less fierce. Shaw's radical rationalism, his utter disregard of conventions, his keen dialectic interest and verbal wit often turn the stage into a forum of ideas.

Other important plays by Shaw include Caesar and Cleopatra (1901) Major Barbara (1905), Androcles and the Lion (1912), and his masterpiece Saint Joan (1923). Candida (1898), with social attitudes toward sex relations as the object of his satire, and Pygmalion (1912), a witty study of phonetics as well as a clever treatment of middle-class morality and class distinction, proved some of Shaw's greatest successes on the stage. It is a combination of the dramatic, the comic, and the social corrective that gives Shaw's comedies their special flavour.

Shaw's complete works appeared in thirty-six volumes between 1930 and 1950, the year of his death.



CARISSA TEELING - Eliza Doolittle This is Carissa's second play at the Genesian Theatre. She studied acting at the Australian Academy of Dramatic Arts and ATYP and has been performing in productions since she was 7 years old. Her previous plays include, Ring Round the Moon, Love and Light, Loves Labours Lost, Beautiful Bodies, Don Juan and Dags.

ROGER GIMBLETT - Henry Higgins Roger last appeared on the Genesian stage covered in green make-up playing Toad in Wind in The Willows. Previous, less green, roles include Soames in The Forsyte Saga, Roy in Cosi, Malvolio in Twelfth Night, Astor in Scotland Road and most recently Siegfried Sassoon in the Sydney, Canberra and Christchurch seasons of the acclaimed WW1 drama Not About Heroes.





TIMOTHY BENNETT - Col. Pickering After appearing last year in Coward's 'Hay Fever' and recently directing Wilde's 'Lord Arthur Savile's Crime' Timothy considers himself fortunate to be involved in another comic masterpiece, Shaw's 'Pygmalion'. Past roles include Harvey (Elwood), Shadowlands(C.S.Lewis),Wind in the Willows(Badger), Twelfth Night(Aguecheek),The Imaginary Invalid(Argan),The Tempest(Trinculo).

MARK LANGHAM - Alfred Doolittle This is Mark's first play in Australia. When dinosaurs ruled the earth he attended the National Youth Theatre of Great Britain and the Royal Scottish Academy of Music and Drama. He has been in the odd play since then. Some of them very odd...





ROS BILBE - Mrs Higgins Ros was last seen at Genesians in Noel Coward's Relative Values. Prior to that, The Merry Wives of Windsor, Appointment With Death, I Hate Hamlet, Something To Hide, Isn't It Romantic, The Slaughter of St. Teresa's Day, Noel Coward's, Still Life and 84 Charing Cross Road. Recent performances elsewhere include Lost in Yonkers Travelling North, Life After George and The Cemetery Club. Ros began her stage career as a dancer with the famous Bluebell Girls, working in the USA, Europe and the Middle East. She has also appeared with Opera Australia and the

Australian Ballet.



ANNE EVERS - Mrs Pearce George Bernard Shaw's Pygmalion is enjoying a worldwide renaissance and Anne is thrilled to be "part of the action"! Previous stage appearance include lead roles in Kindertransport, Merry Wives of Windsor and Scotland Road. Recently honoured with life membership of the Company her last performance, on the Genesian stage, was as the housekeeper in The Hound of the Baskervilles.

JUSTINE KACIR – Clara Justine studied acting at the Australian Academy of Dramatic Art in Sydney, and has since been involved in several theatre and short film productions. Most recently she has appeared in Brecht's 'The Life of Galileo' at the Zenith theatre, and 'Embedded' at this years Short and Sweet play festival. This is her first production with the Genesian Theatre.





LEON JOSEPH – Freddy Leon has always had a love for theatre, and a strong desire to be in the spot light. Beginning his career at Riverview School where he was discovered by theatre legend Mel Morrow, Leon subsequently branched into stand up comedy before arriving at the Genesian to portray the well meaning but not so bright Freddy!

The Genesian Theatre is one of Sydney's most active theatre companies. In addition to six main stage productions each year we run classes, workshops and many other activities.
