

Directors' Note

The Irish have a saying that their greatest export is their people. Many of these hardy exports have found their way to Australia, whether as political prisoners in the early days of transportation or as escapees from the terrible potato famines of the Nineteenth Century or the political and economic "troubles" of the Twentieth Century. This is the story of one Australian family that came from Ireland.
